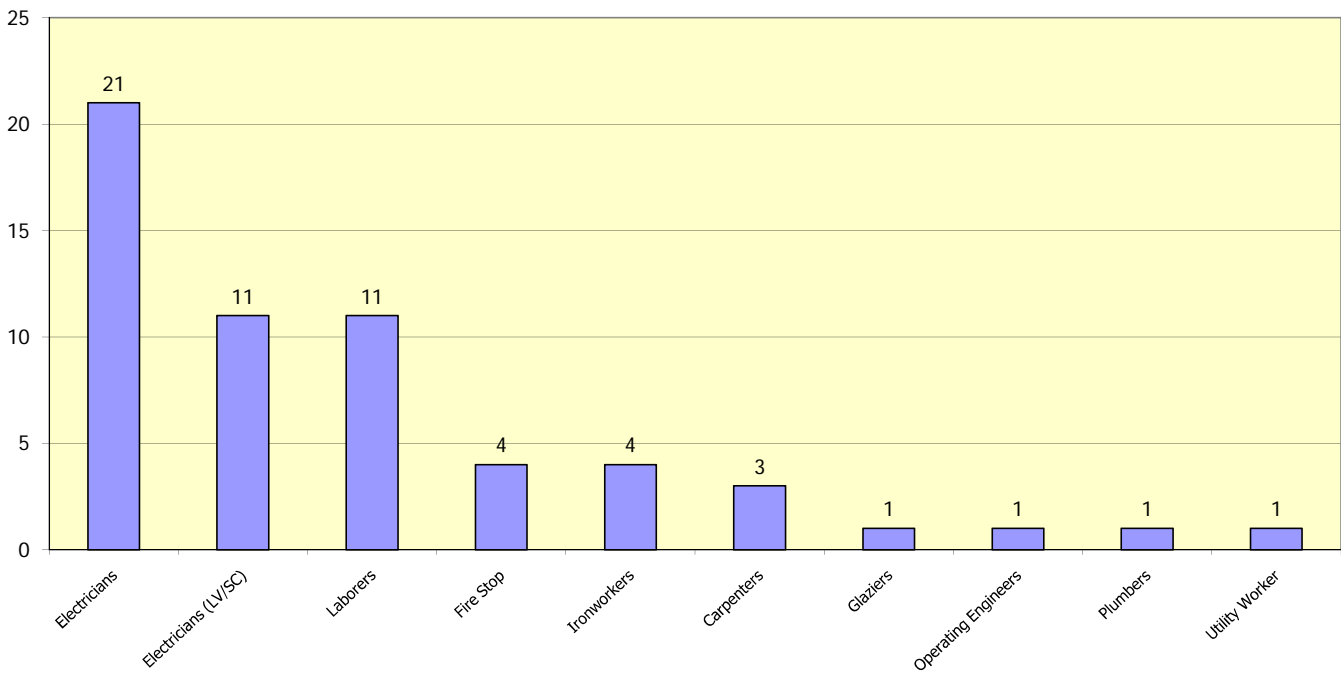
The Apprenticeship Opportunities Project (AOP) was created in 1994 to help low-income individuals, women, and people of color enter and succeed in apprenticeship and trades-related jobs in King County. AOP is operated by Apprenticeship and Nontraditional Employment for Women (ANEW) and is funded by Port Jobs. AOP provides a range of services to prepare people for the trades, such as assistance addressing employment barriers, completing applications, and preparing for interviews.

Total apprenticeship placements (this period): 58

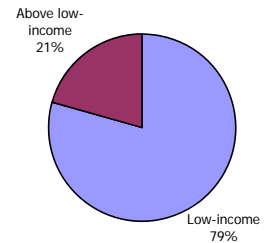
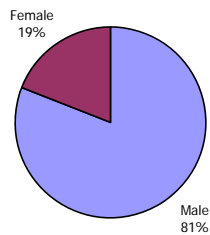
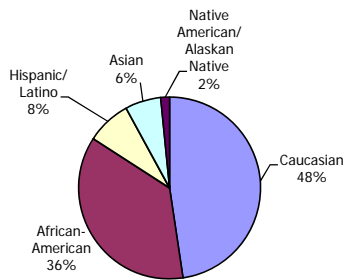
Total trades-related jobs placed (this period): 5

Demographics (for individuals placed in apprenticeship and trades-related jobs)



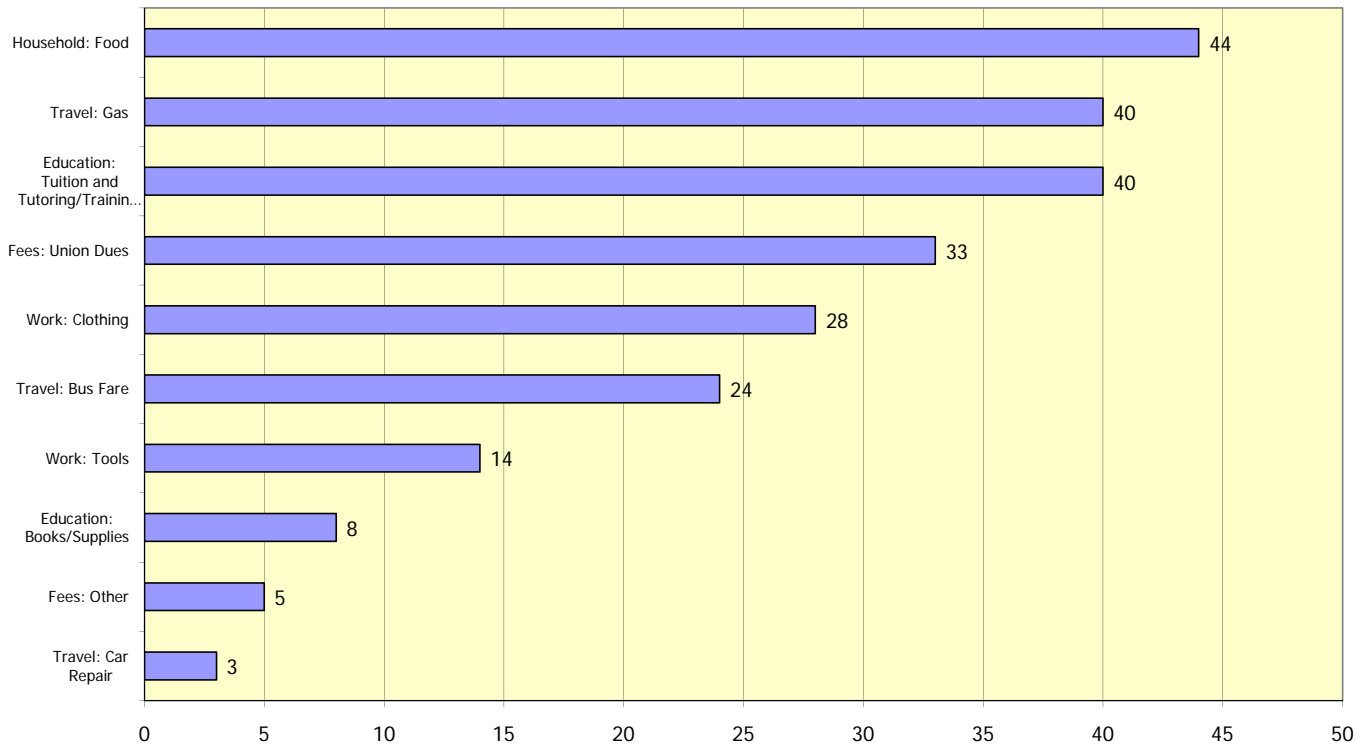
AOP Financial Assistance

Once accepted into an apprenticeship program or upon getting a job, a tradesperson may need help paying for work-related expenses or emergency needs, such as tools, union dues, gas or food. AOP provides financial assistance so people can go to work right away and can stay in their jobs and apprenticeship programs.
